'Power Embodied - Truth made Flesh'

Dear Friends

Today, on this *Feast of Christ the King*, the church's liturgical year comes to its end. In the gospel reading from John, Jesus stands before Pilate and the awful drama of his arrest, suffering and death is on the horizon. At the heart of the meeting of Pilate and Jesus, from John's perspective, are two incarnations, it seems. These are power embodied ranged against truth made flesh. Both Pilate and Jesus claim to rule but their understanding of power and sovereignty are completely different as well as opposed. Pilate's question to Jesus: 'Are you the King of the Jews' shows his incredulity at Jesus' claim. This is because Jesus' kingship and sovereignty are based not on an abuse of power, but self-giving love and service, and the pursuit of truth. We shall explore today what truth means in Jesus' eyes, and how through his pattern of service, and not power, he subverts both the lies of this world and of our own lives. At the end of the church's year, before we begin a new set of readings from next Sunday (Advent 1, Year C, and the gospel being Luke), we do not have it easy. We are faced with the challenge of central spiritual challenges: truth, service, power.

Today is also our *Stewardship Renewal Sunday* when we have an opportunity to renew our pledge of giving to St Michael's for next year, 2022. We make this pledge as a Thanksgiving Offering for the work of God in this place. All the envelopes which are returned today will be brought by the churchwardens to the altar at the offertory where I shall say prayers of blessing over them. What we give in monetary terms is part of our stewardship for the ongoing mission and ministry of our church. Our stewardship is not about money alone, important though that is. What we give of our time and talents is also part of what we give back to God in the service of his Kingdom and to his glory. I want therefore to thank you for all you do, in whatever capacity, and in particular today, to thank you for considering prayerfully what it is you are able to pledge financially for the coming year, and for your generosity.

Worship

<u>This Week</u> The celebrants and preachers for the next four weeks are: Fr Paul on 21 November, the Revd Elizabeth Birch on 28 November, Fr Paul on 5 and 12 December.

Sunday is the feast of Christ the King, the last Sunday of the church's year. Commemorations this week include Monday: Cecilia, martyr, 230; Tuesday: Clement, bishop and martyr, c. 100; Thursday: Catherine, martyr, 4th century, Isaac Watts, hymn writer, 1748.

<u>Cecilia</u> was one of the most revered martyrs of the Roman Church, yet little is known about her beyond the fact that at some point in the second or third century a woman called Cecilia allowed the Church to meet in her house in Trastevere in Rome and that subsequently the church erected on that site bore her name. She is honoured as the patron saint of musicians. From an *Exposition on the Psalms* by St Augustine:

'Sing to God a new song. Sing to him with joyful melody.' ... God himself has provided you with a way of singing. You do not have to bother to search for the right words as if you needed to find a lyric to please God. Simply praise God with 'songs of joy'. It is fine praise of God when you sing with real joy. You ask, how is this done? It means realising that words are not enough to express what we are singing to God in our hearts. At harvest time, both in the fields and the vineyard, the labourers work incredibly had, and they always begin their day with songs whose words express their joy. But when the joy brims over and words are not enough, they abandon even this coherence and give themselves up to the sheer delight of singing.

What is this joy I speak of, this singing exultantly? It is an inner melody that means our hearts are bursting with feeling that words cannot contain. And to whom does such joy belong if not to the God who is beyond language? When words will not come, and you cannot keep silent, what else can you do but let the melody soar? What else can you do when the rejoicing heart runs out of words and the intensity of your joy will not be imprisoned by language? What else can you do but sing out to God with 'songs of joy'?

<u>Thanksgiving Offerings</u> Readers might like to reflect again on these words from a hymn of Saint Ephrem the Syrian.

Blessed is the One who has filled our feast

with sustenance from His treasury!

Guest, prepare your ears

and your mouths to sing praise.

Be receivers and givers;

render glory for what he has provided.

God gave from His treasure;

give, also you, from your treasures.

For God, deeds are simple;

and for you, a hymn of thanksgiving.

God gave as He wished;

give, also you, as you are able.
